Land Acknowledgement

NHS has been doing morning Google Meets for announcements this year. Every Monday we perform the following land acknowledgement:

In the spirit of reconciliation, we want to acknowledge that this virtual gathering is taking place on traditional lands across the province of Alberta - home to many diverse Indigenous, Metis and Inuit peoples. Spanning generations, acknowledgment of the land is a traditional custom of Indigenous peoples and an important part of reconciliation. It gives voice to the authentic history of the land and its original people. Honouring the land in this way acknowledges the story of the creation of this country in a way that has historically been missing.

Indigenous Themes

Teachers have committed to incorporating First Nations, Metis and Inuit learning into lessons throughout the year. This includes one of our beginning teachers who used a science lesson in the Structures and Forces Unit to explore the engineering of the totem pole and its significance to certain Indigenous communities.

Some teachers have made this part of their Professional Growth Plan for the year and have supported one teacher by ordering books they learned about at the IGNITE professional development session.

Student Engagement

NHS recently took part in the Grade 7 and 8 Indigenous student engagement process.

The discussion focused on questions like:

- What does success at school look like?
- How do students view success differently than their peers and their teachers?
- What supports could help with transitions, graduation, etc.?

Students also discussed the barriers and challenges students face, sense of belonging at school, etc. It was a success, providing us with important information on how to better serve our Indigenous student population. We look forward to the final report and recommendations moving forward.

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

We participated in the September 30th National Day for Truth and Reconciliation with several classroom activities planned for all of our students. We are also in the latter stages of planning our Indigenous Peoples' Day celebration with school-wide activities focused on themes including:

- Drummers and a Round Dance
- Historical Activities (Indigenous Floor Map)
- Sport/Physical Activities
- Art Activities
- Food Experience (serving fried bannock at recess)

We celebrated Orange Shirt Day with beading, jigging, and enjoying cooking bannock on a stick with our visiting Kokum's!!!!







Epic had a starring role in our recent Lion King Musical as Scar!



Honouring Spirit and Culture in Learning Commons


We are grateful for the many books we have ordered through the FNMI Library grant.


